



# CLIPPER TIPS

A particular small 'clipper' or a 'trimmer' may be fine to clip a dog, however the same unit will struggle to do a complete clip on a large animal. A bit like using a Mini to tow a loaded horse float.

Appliances do not run forever and it is not always the fault of the product when it stops working!

Firstly, it is very important that you read the manual accompanying the product. Quite often simple problems such as pressing the reset switch because the clipper has been running for too long and is too hot, will fix your problem.

Oiling the clipper blades at the suggested frequent intervals assists in keeping the blades running cooler and sharper for longer. The natty little brush which is in the pack is to help clean the blades and also the air filter.

If the animal being clipped is not clean, the clippers will have a tough job. Dirt in the hair will blunt clipper blades very quickly. Having extra sets of blades on hand will help get the job done and can sometimes help with the stress factor!

Proper maintenance and storing of the unit after each use will not only ensure a longer life for the product, it will be ready to work when it is next used.
